How is your marriage doing? If you were to give a ranking from one to ten, what would you give it? Would your answer be the same as your spouse's?

Over the past 28 years, Doris and I have discovered first-hand that marriage doesn't work very well on auto-pilot. It takes a good amount of investment and work. It is easy to slide into bad habits and let things coast. There have been times in our marriage where we needed a "check-up" and some suggestions about how to get things back on track. I don't think we are alone in this. In fact, the more we talk with couples, the more we realize that everyone has their challenges. We all need encouragement and help!

Over the years, God has given both of us a passion to help couples who are preparing to get married, as well as couples who are already married - especially those who are struggling in their marriage. We have been looking for ways to to help us do that better, and a couple months ago we attended a training course called Prepare & Enrich. The basis of it is to have a couple complete a questionnaire (separately) and then see how their answers compare. Obviously, no questionnaire is going to fix a marriage, but we feel this is a great tool to help a couple understand where they are, and what underlying issues may need some work. Our hope is that this information will be a springboard for good discussion and commitment to working through any potential problem areas.

Our marriages can be great testimonies to our families and friends as to the power of God at work in our lives. Don't settle. Give God the opportunity to transform your marriage. Do the work. Get help. We all are selfish individuals, and so loving another selflessly (especially when you interact so closely) does not come naturally.

This coming fall the elders team is hoping to have another marriage retreat at LCF which will be another opportunity to strengthen your marriage. I encourage you to take advantage of these opportunities and continue to invest in your marriage and make it the very best that

Elders' Notes

We met on May 17th and approved the council's proposal that the budget surplus be divided in the following ways: \$10,000 for the building project; \$10,000 for special projects (electronic drums, streaming video to the lobby, landscaping, a basketball hoop, teen/prayer room furnishings, and blinds; and \$9,651 for general missions.

Reggie Cooper has indicated that he is ready to transition youth leadership to someone else when the time is right. It seemed like a good time to revisit and clarify our vision for the vouth.

Things that we would like to make sure are included:

- Good, Bible-oriented teaching which is interesting, meaningful, and connects well to their lives.
- A missional approach that is service oriented, involved in the ministry of the church, and geared toward community outreach.
- Youth involvement, nurtured by taking them seriously. collaborating with them, and expecting them to take responsibility.
- Good community (which of course means fun!) and the option of staying in the group after graduation.

We see youth leadership as a significant role and think that we probably need a youth minister who would be supported at least part-time (not a volunteer). We aren't in a position to provide this currently, but will begin talking with the finance team and congregation to see if we can work that into our budget and then find someone to hire.

The elders would like to get first-hand input from the youth and parents during this time. Rob is willing to give interim leadership while we are looking for this new youth minister. He will work closely with the youth, lead the Bible study time, and mentor those who have interest in helping out with the various pieces.

Obviously, for Rob to take this one, he will have to offload some of his current responsibilities. We are committed to helping that happen and will be praying for God to provide someone with a passion and vision for youth who can take over permanently. Please pray with us!

We are deeply appreciative of Reggie and grateful for all the hard work he has put into the youth over the past several years. Thank you so much, Reggie, for giving of your time, energy, and gifts!

"God is first, your mother second, and you are third." As a child I really hated being third on his list, but now I see that this is such a necessary order to be kept, and am more aware of how difficult it really is! Even in the midst of an incredibly busy schedule, I am high on my dad's priority list. He has taught me that being involved in ministry is not about maintaining a full schedule of meetings, sermons, and influence: it is about living a life of service to God. He refuses to neglect his morning time with God (no matter the amount of sleep he may have gotten the night before), and no matter how full his day might already be, if I need to talk to him, he somehow always makes time.

My dad loves Jesus more than anyone I know. He fears God, he desires to live for Him in absolutely every aspect of his life and ministry, and he is willing to experience extremely difficult things in order to do that. God has in turn asked our family, and him individually, to walk through some tough seasons, and some very lonely and painful times. As his daughter, I have seen firsthand and been inspired by the struggle and pushback that can come from a life fully devoted to God. However, I have also had the privilege of experiencing deep intimacy and joy that seems to flow hand-in-hand with the difficulty.

I am challenged by my dad: his example of steadfastness and determination to never compromise encourages me to continue pushing, to continue moving forward. He refuses to let me settle for second-best in my life, in my relationship with God, and with others. He knows me very well, and will gently correct me when I'm in the wrong, encourage me in areas I'm weak, and love me through all of it. I have always appreciated our ability to openly communicate with each other about anything: I never feel afraid of approaching a topic with him, and always appreciate his insight (even if I disagree). He finishes what he starts, even if it is hard and costs him dearly. Recently (at my bidding), he decided to finish what he began at Rosedale 30 years ago, and spent countless hours pouring over algebra problems so he could graduate with me. Looking back, I honestly don't know how he did it, especially considering his ministry load as a pastor during that time (and roles of father and husband) did not lessen by any means, but I am so proud of him for doing it anyway.

I feel it is entirely incomplete to tribute my dad without also acknowledging my mom, and I know my dad would agree. My mom has supported my dad in his ministry, even when it means sacrifice and a tougher lifestyle. When everyone else has turned against him, my mom remains there, next to her husband. My dad would be the first to tell you that his ministry has been nothing without my mother, and they would both be quick to add that whatever "success" they've had is really all thanks to God. It is this example of serving and following Jesus no matter the cost, being willing to change and be molded under the Potter's



hands, and not being too proud to humble themselves before their children and ask for forgiveness if they need to, that has greatly influenced and inspired me. I am forever grateful for the parents God has blessed me with.

A Tasteful Reminder of Thailand


