I met Ryan after hearing about him from Sheila Miller. She asked, "Have you seen the young man here in London who wears fox ears and a tail? Don't you think that would be an interesting story?" I love a good story, and this had all the earmarks of one.

I was intrigued. I hadn't seen him before, but not too long after that conversation I was on my way to Walmart, and I saw him walking. I knew it had to be him, because as I drove up behind him, I noticed he was wearing fox ears, paws, and a tail. I stopped, we talked, and I set up an interview time.

"As cliché as it sounds," Ryan says, "it felt right. It could be because my childhood hero was Fox McCloud, from the Starfox series that still goes on to this day. He is an anthropomorphic fox that flies what is basically a jet in space to shoot down baddies. Even though wolves are my favorite animal, the fox just felt right."

So he dons his ears, paws, and tail, called Partials, because complete Fur-suits are highly expensive pieces of art that are often designed and drawn out by someone, commissioned for an average of \$1,500-3,000 or even more, and can take over a year to be made.

"My girlfriend, Kimberly, got me into it," he says. "I had no idea what it was at the time, and she got me interested by showing off her own Furry partials. Also, because it lets me feel closer to being an anthropomorphic fox, which makes me happier. I like animals, and I like to be different. So the change into being a Furry was pretty easy for me."

Kimberly wears cat ears, paws, and a tail, and together, she and Ryan wear their partials with pride.

Ryan says going out into public was hard, at first. "Strangers give me more problems than anything. An example is a local fast food chain's employees spreading rumors about me. Another person cussed me out for what I wear. No physical encounters yet, thankfully. After a while it died down, and now it's pretty uncommon."

He doesn't like the attention, but a part of him wants to learn to socialize more. Growing up, he disliked being around people, and wearing the partials is a way for him to get out and experience new things and new people.

Ryan says, "Like any so-called "strange" group, the Furry community is subject to misconceptions, to being picked on or generalized to the point that people, well—miss the point. The Furry community is about having fun and sharing interests. It's no different than someone who is enthusiastic about cars going to a car show, or someone who likes video games going to E3. It's just our interests are human-like animals and regular animals, too. The Conventions often hold charitiy events for local pounds and animal-related services."

We all know what it's like to feel "other than" and unaccepted, especially as Christians. It makes no difference if we wear a regular suit or a Fur-suit—Jesus loves us without bias.

Ryan chooses to take on a persona, or fursona, to open himself up to others. It might be difficult, but in the same token, he feels it frees him. I wonder what Jesus would have done, in His day, if he'd run across a Ryan?

I think He would have sat down, listened to his story, and loved him unconditionally.
