Generous Giving

At the Conservative Mennonite Conference that was held in Delaware this past August, Mark Yoder related a story of a fast-growing denomination in Tanzania, a Seventh-day Adventist group. Mark is an ordained minister in the CMC Conference and owner and administrator of a nursing home in Greenwood, Delaware. He is also a board member of Rosedale Mennonite Missions. I was both challenged and impressed by what Mark had to say and have been wondering what would happen to LCF and other CMC churches if we would follow such a pattern?

On one of Mark's overseas missions travels he met a delegation of Seventh-day Adventists at the Amsterdam Airport. In their visit together, they talked about the rapid church growth taking

place in their country of Tanzania. They reported that 90% of their people were giving 20% of their income. 10% of what is given goes to the local church for its programs and the other 10% is used for evangelistic endeavors. What could happen if 90% of our LCFers decided to give 20% of their income to the church? I don't know what our current level of giving is at LCF. Is it 5%, 10%, 15%? I don't know. Some statistics regarding giving of Evangelical Christian Churches, in the past, reported it to be in the 5 - 7% range. I doubt it has increased since then. I would like to think that the giving level at LCF would be higher than the average church. I know our church has some very generous givers. I don't recall LCF ever coming in under budget or even making special appeals for operating funds.

One question that is often asked concerning giving is, "How do I calculate my tithe? Is it on my net income (income after expenses) or on the gross (including all income and benefits)?" For me, the tithe involves all of my total income, which includes investment earnings.

What A Difference A Shoebox Can Make!

November is the time people pack shoeboxes with toiletries, school supplies, clothing, toys, and gifts to participate in the Samaritan's Purse ministry called Operation Christmas Child. The boxes, once packed, are shipped around the world with the desire to share God's love with children who have very little.



LCF works together in various ways for this ministry project—collecting items throughout the year, making craft projects to include, and then getting together on a Saturday in November to pack lots of shoe boxes. Last year LCF packed 200 boxes. This year our goal is 250 boxes.

The older children's age group, 10-14 years, receives the fewest number of boxes every year. Therefore, that is the age group that LCF packs for, both for boys and girls.

The shoeboxes not only provide a gift for the child, but also include "The Greatest Gift" Gospel booklet and the opportunity to attend "The Greatest Journey" multi-week class offered through local churches in their area.




Where are you both from, originally?




Generous Giving...Continued

We hear much about discipling and accountability, but I wonder how much of it includes money matters? The American people hold our politicians to a standard that I doubt many of us would want to adhere to ourselves – revealing our Federal Tax returns to the general public. I'm not sure that having the church ask people to be that transparent would serve a good purpose, but it does give us something to think about. I suspect that such transparency would increase our giving. Our finances are a very private matter, but we need to remember that the Lord knows everything about them, and we are accountable to him. In Luke 21 we have the story of the widow giving her two mites while Jesus was watching people give their alms. Jesus is still watching our giving and our spending.

35 years ago, Billy Graham wrote, "In the past few years, people have spent ten times as much for luxury and non-essentials as they have for charitable and religious purposes." Is that any different today? If you are not a tither and would like to become one, you may need to start by reviewing your spending habits. Billy Graham also said, "The tithe is the Lord's. If you use it for yourself you are robbing God." If churches today would receive a tithe (10%) from each attendee, I'm guessing that most churches would experience a significant increase in income.

We will be held accountable for how we manage our finances and how much we contribute to God's kingdom -building purposes. Jesus commended the widow in Luke 21 for her generosity, saying that she gave out of her living, by giving all, whereas others merely gave of their extras. The point can be made that Jesus is still watching as we give our tithes and offerings. What might Jesus say about what I put in the offering? I hear the phrase, "Give as the Lord has blessed you." Perhaps it would be more appropriate to say, "Give so the Lord can bless you." Remember, God loves a cheerful giver.





This is the story of one recipient, Shukuran Banda. He loved the items in the shoebox he received but was more interested in what he read in the booklet and learned in the classes at a church in his Malawi village. That is where he gave his heart to Christ after the second week of the class. He then invited his mother and siblings to attend church with him, where they also became Christians. His father left his family because of their new faith. But the tool set provided in his Shoebox allowed Shukuran to do odd jobs for others to help earn income to support their now Christian family.

We hope that all of you will join us for this year's Operation Christmas Child packing party on Saturday, November 19th. We will begin at 9:00 a.m. and will work until all 250 boxes are packed (hopefully around noon). The more people who come, the quicker we will get done. Don't miss this wonderful opportunity to help share God's love with children all over the world!
