### Drew Hoffman:



# Reflections on God's Faithfulness

This has been a challenging year for me. Life has a funny way of throwing one hurdle after another at you. Sometimes you stumble and fall short. Yet, through those same trials I have found that you can also experience God's faithful guidance.

My husband, Nathaniel, was deployed to Afghanistan in May 2013, only three months after we were married. I soon became depressed and experienced insomnia. Through this trial I had to learn to trust God and open my heart to new possibilities. At the time I was dealing with bouts of loneliness, and I felt that I didn't have anyone to confide in. I was searching for answers. Little did I know, though, that God was guiding me. As a result of his presence, I decided to make positive changes in my life.

I began to craft again and involved myself in church activities. When I needed guidance I turned to God in devotion and prayer. During my constant conversation with God, I began to find answers through verses in my devotions. I would post these meaningful verses on my bulletin board in my office and my chalkboard above the kitchen sink. These verses helped to keep me on the right path and always reminded me of God's love and his promises. Romans 8:35, 38-39 helped me when I felt alone.

As I pushed myself to open up to others and let my guard down, I was rewarded with so many new opportunities.

What I can sum up from my year of unending trials is that God is faithful and he is full of grace. I challenge each one of you to step up and encourage others in the church when they are struggling. I received the most help and blessings from those who brought me meals, sent me encouraging letters, and prayed for me.
