A Message from the Pastor

I need the church. (I'm talking about the people, not some structure or organization.) I would be in trouble without it. I need to learn from the wisdom and experience of the older generation among us like Dorothy and Goldie. I need to hang out with the young people to keep from getting out of touch, stuck in my ways, and just plain boring. I need people like my fellow pastor Reuben, who helps me navigate the challenges of leadership, challenges me intellectually, and is dedicated to the word of God. I need to study the Bible with people from all different backgrounds, cultures, and experiences, to see the truth of God's word through the eyes of others. Yes, I even need those who interpret the Bible differently than me, to refine and challenge my own interpretation. I need to see the "first love" of a new believer for Christ and the refined faith of those who have walked with him for years. I need the church.



Not everyone does. I get it. The church can be a tough place. My deepest hurts have probably come from the church. As a P.K., I grew up in the shadow of the pain my father experienced as a pastor. In fact, my mother was not that excited about me becoming a pastor. It can be hard to be in the church. My experience is not unique.

Yet, we are described as a body with Jesus being the head. We need each other. God's design is for us to be closely connected to one another. There is never a good reason to separate, disconnect, or remain distant from the church. To separate from the church is to separate from Christ himself.

However, I know that painful separation occurs. I have experienced it often and sometimes it is beyond our control. Why does it happen? Because we decide at some level that we don't need the church. We don't need to put up with this person. We don't need to hear this teaching. We don't need to get involved. It's too costly. It's too time consuming. It's too painful. It's too vulnerable. I get it. I've said all of those things at one time or another.

And yet, each time I step back, something dies within me. Each time I cut out part of the church, my vision gets a little narrower. I am separating from the body of Christ and I am dying in the process.

And so...I'm all in. I need you and, believe it or not, you need me. We were meant to do this together. Christ is building the church and, for all it's difficulties, it will prevail. In the end, it will be presented as a radiant church, without stain or wrinkle, but holy and blameless. Even so, come Lord Jesus.

Leadership Team Retreat Summary

The Leadership Team enjoyed its annual retreat at the Procter Center (near Midway) November 7-8. Roger and Sharon Hazen were there too, which made conversation move right along. Roger is our overseer and pastors Pineview Mennonite church in Vassar, Michigan.

On Friday evening we discussed how to incorporate reading more of God's Word into our services and how to encourage people in our congregation to read the Bible regularly as individuals. We also spent time catching up with each other and praying for people and needs in our congregation.

On Saturday morning, Roger and Reuben walked us through an overview of elders in the Bible. A couple of highlights of this discussion: it seems that the character of an elder is more important than the tasks he performs; the word "pastor" is only mentioned once in the New Testament (in Ephesians), otherwise church leadership is designated as elder; the primary task of an elder is to guard the truth and preserve apostolic teaching—to be the one who does not compromise and who holds the church to stand for truth.

Of course, much fun was had with 1 Timothy 3:3, which says elders are "not to be given to much wine or pugnacious."

We launched into a discussion of the role of elders at LCF, in part to clarify what the elders would be doing and what they hoped the proposed LCF Council would do.

We agreed that all work is spiritual. This would include the work of the elders and the work of the Council. We spent a lot of time talking about gender roles. We want to be true to God's Word and provide women every opportunity to use their gifts and abilities.



In fact, we want everyone to be able to give input, whether they are elders or on the new Council or not. One way to do this might be to have more congregational meetings, with the larger group divided up into table groups to discuss issues and provide feedback.

We believe the Bible makes a distinction that the roles of elders is for men. Yet we like LCF's tradition of having the

wives of pastors and elders participate in the meetings to add the voice of women. The idea of inviting other women to have a voice at these meetings was discussed, but not agreed upon.

Rob proposed that we continue with the elders team being composed of 2 pastors and 3 elders (if possible), with their wives being invited to participate in the meetings. He also proposed that we change the election process from a congregational nomination and vote to an elders team nomination and congregational affirmation. (We will inform the congregation that we're in the process of praying about and considering elder selection and invite them to share any suggestion or feedback they have with us.). This motion passed.

Next we worked on a list of elders' tasks and clarified the wording on the LCF Council Proposal. The elders' job description is a work in progress, but it reflects our desire to:

- Be faithful to the Word of God
- Develop the preaching and teaching ministry of the church
- Be intentional about congregational care
- Equip and train the saints for ministry
- Cultivate the ministry gifts of women
- Create a culture of discipleship and spiritual formation
- Elevate the priority of prayer
- Make more leaders
- Provide vision and leadership for the church

Please join us in praying that Jesus would be the center of all that we do here at LCF this Christmas season.

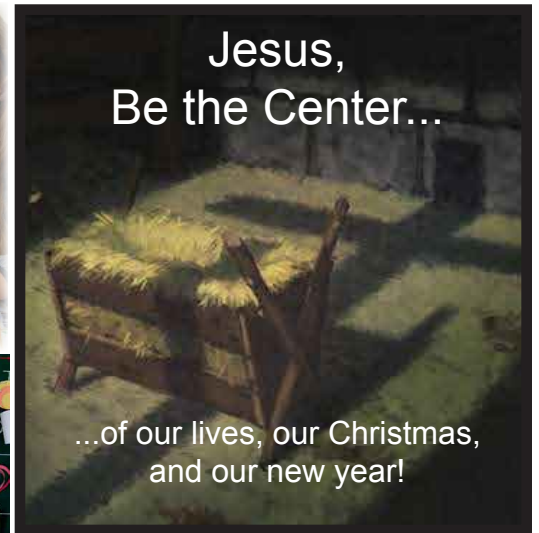
- Pray for the 100 children who will be receiving the Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes that we wrapped, packed, and shipped this past month.
