Investing Wisely for Love

2015 is under way and many have set their goals for the new year-better health, less stress, and better investment strategies. With the beginning of February approaching and Valentine's Day coming soon, what are you doing to better invest in your relationships and marriage?

When talking about investments, most people think about money, savings, and retirement. But in a successful marriage and relationship, both husband and wife must be willing to invest time and energy. And all marriages, no matter how good, can be made better.

If you consulted a financial planner about investing in your future, he would advise: invest money regularly. The type of financial investments you make will change at different times in your life. Yet the principles hold true for love, marriage, and relationships. Both partners must invest regularly in the relationship to make it flourish. Many believe a relationship is only good if it comes easily. But the reality is this... most good relationships require a lot of work. It takes a daily investment of time, communication, and being there for the other person.

Don't get lazy about your relationship. If you stopped investing in your savings account, you wouldn't be surprised when you had very little in it. Relationships need a regular Continued on page 4...

How do you decide on what songs to play on Sunday mornings?

(Rob) Each of us worship leaders is influenced by the songs that we like and the songs we know that other people like. We tend to get different styles or songs based on the worship leader. We have not chosen a particular style for LCF, but consider our worship style to be eclectic. We have people that prefer hymns and others that like newer music. It can be helpful to hear what

songs people in the congregation like, which helps influence what we choose. We try not to have too many "new" songs because we want the congregation to be able to learn the songs we play fairly quickly and not always be learning new songs. Our definition of a new song is one that we have not sung in the past 365 days whether brand new or old.

I usually settle on a theme that each of the songs contribute to. The rhythm of the songs is important to look at as well. Too many "upbeat" songs can get tiresome. Too many slow songs can be uninspiring. A mix is usually good. The words of the songs are obviously really important. Lighter songs can be fun, but I tend to prefer ones that are understandable but have some depth to the lyrics.



Also, we do not want to be leading songs that are theologically weak. I am trusting that the Lord will guide me as I pick out songs. I pray about it and then as I look through songs, I'm asking God to prompt me in choosing a group to start with. Then I start narrowing the group of songs down to the five or six that we will use on Sunday morning. In the end, I pray that the Lord will use the songs to draw people to himself.

(Larissa) There's not always a set requirement or process, but I often pull out my two large worship notebooks and play through them and during that individual time of worship, God draws my heart to different songs. Sometimes, he is speaking to me through the songs or he is showing me some theme or connection between them. The organizer in me loves to have songs that build on each other or that center around an idea or theme, but other times, when I have to pull some songs together in a pinch for a small group setting or have to plan on the fly, I have to more heavily rely on the guidance of the Holy Spirit. No matter what the situation though, I have to always pray and trust that the Lord is guiding and directing people's hearts towards him, no matter which songs I choose.

(Aaron) The way I choose songs differs from week to week. Sometimes I choose songs based on what I feel God has been teaching me that week. Other times I have a song I like and I try to base the other songs around whatever theme that particular song focuses on. Also, when I lead a new song I try to lead it at least two or three times in a row to make it more familiar.

Are there any particular songs that you have found encouraging in times of struggle?

(Rob) Right now, I really like the songs "Anchor", "My Lighthouse", "Oceans", and "It is Well". They are about the joy and the hope that we can have in Christ even when things are difficult.

(Larissa) It's always amazing how God uses a song to speak what I'm thinking, feeling or experiencing. There are so many songs that I can think of that encourage me when I'm feeling overwhelmed or depressed and I've made a playlist on Spotify for that very reason. It's entitled "For the Moments I Feel Faint," which is actually the name of a Relient K song. Some of my favorite songs on this playlist are "I Shall Not Want" by Audrey Assad, "Sacred" by Above the Golden State, "Psalm 118" by Shane and Shane, "Your Love is Strong" by Jon Foreman, and "Give Me Faith" by Elevation Worship. Some of my current favorite worship bands are: Rend Collective, Esterlyn, Sovereign Grace Music, All Sons and Daughters, and Shane and Shane.

(Aaron) Yes, there are many songs I have found uplifting. "Come as You Are" by David Crowder is a song that is about coming to God as you are because he loves you no matter what you've done or where you've been. I tend to be really hard on myself, sometimes falling for the lie that I cannot come to God for help because I'm not good enough. That song has helped to remind me that God wants me anyways; even when I fail, he will take me just as I am. As for new songs I would recommend "Shoulders" by For King & Country and "You Gave Your Life" by Laura Story. Also Jonathan Thulin is another great artist.

Thanks, Rob, Larissa, and Aaron for the "window" into the worship-leading experience and for your great song recommendations! Thanks also, to all the worship leaders who take the time to seek God and lead us in worship each Sunday.

To conclude, we as believers are to give praise and honor to him through all that we do. As it states in John 4:24; "God is spirit, and his worshipers must worship in the Spirit and in truth." Let's take these song recommendations to heart and uplift each other in times of struggle. Grace be to God for he is always with us.

Most of you know Anna Rosati, who is the daughter of Jack and Molly Rosati, and a long-time member of the church family at LCF. You probably also know that she has been teaching in Thailand over the past few years. You've seen her e-mailed prayer updates and she comes to visit when she's back home (like this Christmas). What you may not know, is that Anna has now joined the mission team of Rosedale Mennonite Missions in Bangkok! This is great news for us personally, as members of that team, and for the work in general, it's a huge blessing. As you know, Anna is a gifted teacher, as well as a humble person with a sincere desire to serve Jesus.



For those of you who haven't heard the story of how she ended up in Thailand, here it is! Anna attended Cedarville University, studying Elementary Education and ESL (English as a Second Language) and had the opportunity to do her student teaching in Bangkok. Anna taught at the International Community School (ICS) and fell in love with the school and with Thailand. She had peace about returning and when a teaching position became available, she decided to return the following year.



Anna is now in her second year of teaching at ICS and has committed to an additional year. She teaches students in grades K-5 in a pull-out ESL classroom. She is very involved in many other areas of school life as well including: English testing for admissions, facilitating chapel, teaching an after school Bible program, and tutoring. Outside of school, Anna enjoys time with her friends, running (when it's not unbearably hot!), studying Thai with a tutor, and going on adventures around Thailand with her friends. She is also working with a ministry called Lifesong whose mission is to rescue and disciple children found in migrant construction sites and slum communities. Anna participates in this ministry by teaching English classes to children of Cambodian construction workers and local Thai kids who

don't have the opportunity to learn from native English speakers. She has made occasional trips to Cambodia to support the Cambodian side of the ministry.

Anna is a covenant worker with RMM, which means she has a job that provides for her financial needs but will work with RMM's team in its ministry and will support RMM vision in Thailand. Anna says that she always had the goal of using ESL in a missions setting and is excited to see this dream becoming a reality as she comes alongside the team. 
