Thoughts from New Fathers at LCF


With Father's Day approaching, several of our new dads give us insight into how they feel about their new role.

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Believe In Jesus

A Message from the Pastor

Faith in Jesus Christ has many levels. Let's remind ourselves of the difference between believing

about and believing **in**. Believing about is necessary, but it is only a starting place. James so bluntly said, in James 2:19, "You believe that God is one; you do well. Even the demons believe—and shudder!" Believing **in** means investing in that belief—trusting. The test is when we find ourselves in sticky, depressing, dangerous, or confusing situations. We can all be comforted when we think of 12 or so scared men in a sinking boat. Jesus calmed the storm, and he said to them, "Why are you afraid, O you of little faith?" Then he rose and rebuked the winds and the sea, and there was a great calm.

Life presents problems that make it hard to believe. Our money, health, and family problems that make us worry are each an opportunity to trust Jesus. Matthew 6:27 says, "And which of you by being anxious can add a single hour to his span of life?" The goal is not to stoically endure "the slings and arrows of outrageous fortune" and hope it pays off in the end. God is here, he cares, and he acts. God said to Isaiah, in Isaiah 59:1, "Behold, the Lord's hand is not shortened, that it cannot save, or his ear dull, that it cannot hear." One benefit of fellowship is to hear from those who echo King David in Psalm 34. "I sought the LORD, and he answered me and delivered me from all my fears. Those who look to him are radiant, and their faces shall never be ashamed. This poor man cried, and the LORD heard him and saved him out of all his troubles."

Some of the problems that test us have private and public dimensions. The church today is challenged with questions about gender, sexuality, marriage, and more. Among other things, the church has had to recognize that it is only one voice in a pluralistic society. Although we might learn that our Bible interpretation or application hasn't been right, let's assume for a moment it has been right, even though some still think our beliefs are backward, destructive, and socially unacceptable. How will we respond? Flex our muscles and fight back? There are those who do that. They're not succeeding, and I'm not sure I want them to, because I'm pretty sure that's not Jesus' way. Should we compromise what the Bible teaches? There's a fair amount of that going on, too. It won't produce good results. I'd say, trust God and be confident in the Bible. As Psalm 119:130 says, "The unfolding of your words gives light; it imparts understanding to the simple." Our teachings may become unpopular, but "why are you afraid?" Believe in Jesus.

On May 5, the elders' team met at Rob and Doris's place and focused on different aspects of leadership:

Elders: We approved an updated version of the job description for elders and are still working on details of the selection process, which is in transition right now.

Moderator: We would like to invite more people to share the role of moderator in our services. This is a very visible and important role (creating a warm and welcoming presence, keeping an eye on the time and making necessary adjustments, knowing how to respond to and pray for requests that are shared, etc.). We'll spend time making sure that each moderator is adequately trained for the responsibility.

Discipleship: It is the power of God, especially through prayer and scripture, that changes lives. We want to make sure that we provide sufficient time for both at LCF. How can we do this effectively? What will help people take advantage of the opportunities we do offer? How can we encourage people to be Christians at home, spending time in prayer and Bible reading?

We agreed that our discipleship plan should be flexible, diverse, and intergenerational, and we plan to spend some focused time in our upcoming meetings reviewing and discussing how we make disciples at LCF.

Leadership training: We would like to be more directive in equipping people to serve in leadership roles at LCF, including small group leaders, our RBC Bridge intern Benji Martin (arriving this fall), and others from LCF who are interested in leadership training and development.

The plan is to develop a program of short sessions that are taught by a variety of people and cover a wide range of topics.

With all this emphasis on change, we recognize that many good things are happening among us, for which we are very thankful!

Reggie Cooper, new father to Alexandria, provides insight into how fatherhood has impacted his life.


