As we closed the back door of the small moving van filled with what was left of Tom & Candice's possessions, I had to wonder what it would be like to do this. What

would it be like to condense my belongings down into a small moving van? How about a couple suitcases for the Thailand trip? How would I decide what to keep, what to put in storage, and what to give away or sell on Craigslist? How would I help my kids decide what is important to take and what is not?

While we may not be moving to Thailand, I think it would be helpful for us to go through a similar process, as the Mast family did, to simplify. I remember when they returned to the U.S. a couple years ago they couldn't get over how many people had large screen TVs; not just one, but several. We who live here tend not to notice as culture dictates new things as necessities.

Jesus probably lived one of the most simple lives of anyone. He did not even have a home. And when he sends his disciples out he tells them not to even take an extra pair of shoes. Try that for your next trip! ^(c)

Things can get in the way of our walk with God. Could I walk away from my "stuff" if God called me to Thailand or some other place in the world? Would I be like the rich young man, unable to part with my things for the sake of the kingdom of God? Things consume tremendous amounts of time and resources. How many gadgets do we need? How many social networks do we need to be a part of? How nice do my clothes need to be? How many computers do I really need? ⁽ⁱ⁾

It was interesting to watch the Mast family purposefully not accumulate things while they were in the states for these two years. They knew they were just here temporarily. I think it would be good for all of us to think of this life in that way. We don't need bigger barns.

Watching the Masts condense their belongings into a small moving van and a few suitcases ignited a desire in me to do some similar things. I want to be free of "stuff"; free to respond to God's call, free to give, free to share, free to go, free to be with God. Thanks for the example, Tom & Candice!

Feel like leading?

The team has discussed how to develop leadership gifts in the church for quite a while. Two priorities have emerged: expanding the number of moderators and launching a leadership training course at LCF. We devoted most of our June 2nd meeting to this topic.

Moderators

Our current moderators are Bob Zachrich, Reuben Sairs, and Danny Ndungu. We would like to add Jeremy Hisey, Naomy Ndungu, and Vicki Sairs.

Moderators play a significant role on Sunday morning. They open the service, welcoming people warmly and creating space for a worshipful attitude with their words, prayers, and Scripture reading. After the sermon, they conduct the prayer time in a thoughtful way. They have to think on their feet, be sensitive to the needs of those present and absent, and know how to close the service with grace and clarity.

To help prepare people for this role, Rob would like to have a yearly moderator training meeting.

Leadership Training

A leadership training course is also in the works. We hope to launch it this fall and have it run during the upcoming school year, ending next May.

The current plan is to conduct three to four group training sessions, with all participants having the opportunity to help out with each of the following areas of ministry: children (Sunday school and nursery), junior youth, youth, welcome and fellowship, building and grounds, worship, benevolence, small groups, council, elder, and pastoral duties.

Since some of these areas include working with children and youth, participants will need to complete a child protection screening application, if they haven't already done so.

We are working on specific content in the group training sessions. We hope to cover spiritual and devotional life, character development, communication skills, servant leadership, and cultivating a "big picture" view of work in God's Kingdom.

After participants have gone through the group training sessions and worked in each of the ministry areas, they can choose an area where they would like to serve. We hope to pair each person who completes the course with someone who can mentor them, using an individualized training plan.
