A time of celebration. I am fortunate to have my Mom (pictured with me on the right) still living and to be such an important part of my life. She has taught me well, and continues to provide guidance, love and support. I'm reminded of Proverbs 6:20-22 (The Passion Translation) "My child, obey your father's godly instruction and follow your mother's lifegiving teaching. Fill your heart with their advice and let your life be shaped by what they've taught you. Their wisdom will guide you where ever you go and keep you from bringing harm to yourself. 

Bob closed our time with prayer. Our next meeting: Tuesday, May 8th.




### A Letter from the Mast Family

Hello church family at LCF! We miss all of you and are so excited to reconnect this summer with old friends and meet new ones who have more recently started attending LCF! Our family is Tom and Candice and our three kids, Claire (15), Eliza (13), and Si (9). We have lived in Bangkok Thailand, working for Rosedale Mennonite Missions, for almost 10 years now. This last term has been three years so we are very anxious to get back and see all our friends and family stateside!



It's been a very interesting three years with many new developments as far as connections and new opportunities. Hopefully you have seen our newsletter which came out April 12 (if not, check your e-mail!) which has ministry updates and prayer ideas. To wrap it up in a nutshell, we are involved in supporting reproducing simple churches in Bangladesh and Laos as well as supporting local ministries here in Bangkok and leading our Rosedale Mennonite Missions team of 14 adults (including a short-term team of five). Anna Rosati, from LCF, is also a teammate! We teach English as well, partly for ministry opportunities, to meet a need locally, and to raise support for our family. In addition to his Regional Director duties, Tom is in a graduate program through Biola University, working on a Masters in Intercultural Studies, which has led to more recent contact with refugees here in Bangkok. Learning about the plight of Pakistani Christians, who are relocated here due to persecution and lacking refugee status in Thailand, has touched our hearts and we are making friends and hoping to help in some small ways.

Our kids all attend International Community School (4th, 7th, and 9th grades), a Christian school with a very diverse student body with plenty of opportunity for cultural learning and experiences. The two youngest have begun to study guitar recently, and Si is an avid runner (cross country and track). Claire, our oldest, is involved in after school tutoring and co-leading a creative writing club. Our family enjoys teaching Cambodian kids at Construction of Hope (which Anna Rosati gives leadership to) on Saturdays, once a month.



So, that's a quick overview of life at the moment! We are in the middle of hot season here, so we will be happy to come to the States in spring for some relief from the 90s and high humidity as well as city smog! Next week is the Thai New Year so there will be a school break and country-wide water fights to celebrate, making it easily our kids' favorite Thai holiday.

As always, we are so grateful for all the ways you support us, from kind gifts to notes on Facebook and especially your prayers. Thank you for holding us and our friends here up to the Light! We see it making a difference! As you may know, our mission support team is all from LCF, and recently we made some changes to simplify things a bit. Our team now consists of Molly Rosati who will keep you informed of our prayer needs and Rob and Doris who provide pastoral care to us on-field. We are also very grateful to Dale and Sharon who have served in the past as logistics coordinators, Lucy Elfrink, who has connected our kids with the church, and Danny Ndungu who was our last prayer coordinator. Thank you for caring for our family!

We plan to attend church at LCF July 8 and 15 so we will hopefully see most of you then!
