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What is Zero Gravity?

Zero Gravity, often referred to as Junior Youth, is for grades 4 - 8 and meets at LCF on the first and third Sunday of each month from 6 - 8 p.m. The meetings usually consist of a Bible lesson, prayer time, snack time and games. I serve as the leader for Zero Gravity and am thankful to have assistance from Justin Scheffel and Bryce Swartz.

At the beginning of 2018, Zero Gravity took on a new study format. Each kid has his or her own prayer journal that they personalized, and each lesson is based on Scripture. Some of the topics that have been discussed are: God has a purpose for everyone, Forgiveness, Choices, Judging Others, Friendship, and most recently, the Romans Road to Salvation. After the topic is discussed in the group, each kid takes his or her own prayer journal and follows the S.O.A.P. format:

- S: Scripture; write out one verse that was meaningful to you
- O: Observation; what was interesting in this passage? What did you learn? What was God saying to you?
- A: Application; how can you apply this Scripture to your life? How will you let it change you?
- P: Prayer; respond to God in prayer, use the Scripture as a guide. Ask God to help you meditate and apply the Scripture to your life.

Following this template helps us stay on topic, because that can be a struggle sometimes. ☺

(180 Ministries creates a safe community where men can find freedom from sexual brokenness and grow strong in their relationship with God.)

We shared updates and prayer requests for various people at LCF—guests among us, those who are experiencing significant difficulties, dealing with health issues, growing in Christ, etc. We will continue to be in prayer for each of these situations and look forward to seeing how God is going to continue to work.

Reuben closed our time with prayer, remembering the many situations we discussed. Our next meeting: Tuesday, June 19th. ■



Council Update

It is a beautiful time of year as we transition into summer and the blessings of much warmer weather. We are approaching the halfway point of the year, and the LCF Council has been diving into several projects. Currently, we are working on tackling the revision of LCF's Child Protection Policy and discussing how to move forward with the old church building.

The LCF Child Protection Policy has been reviewed and discussed thoroughly amongst the Council. Input has been well-received and greatly appreciated from other members of the church that are in charge of our children's care, events, etc. Our new electronic background checks system is established, and we discussed how to phase in the background checks over the course of the next couple of years, to offset the necessary cost to provide them. All new volunteers will have the background check added to their screening process and one-third of the current volunteers will have a background check added by the end of this year. The rest of the background checks of current volunteers will be divided up over the next two years. The names of those who will be checked will be determined based on the time frame of completion. The revised LCF Child Protection Policy will be published after the remaining edits have been completed.

The old church building was discussed. It has been on the market for four years and is no longer being leased. It was decided that we should entertain all offers for a few months before listing it with a real estate agent.
