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How Do We Pray?

A Message from the Pastor by Rob Swartz

The opportunity that we have as believers to come before the throne of God with our petitions, thoughts, and requests is nothing short of amazing. Why would the sovereign God of the universe want to hear from us? And yet...he does! He tells us to ask, to seek, and to knock, and he

will respond. He tells us to persist in prayer and not to give up. And so...we pray!

But how do we pray? This is probably as varied as we are people. The truth is that prayer is a multi-splendored thing, and we hope to grow in it together as a body of believers at LCF.

It is to this purpose that the elders have made some changes to our Sunday morning prayer time following the message. We want to expand our understanding and practice of prayer, moving beyond personal prayer requests to explore a broader range of prayer topics and ways to pray about them.

If we look at the Bible we see lots of variety. Jesus encouraged people to pray in their closets. © Jesus often withdrew to pray in lonely, desolate places. We see the early church gathered together (in Acts 4) praying with one voice. When Peter is in prison, we see a prayer meeting at someone's house where the church is gathered in prayer. The disciples ask Jesus how to pray, and he gives them some instruction in what we now call "The Lord's Prayer." Paul often mentions in his letters how he prays continually for the believers in these various churches. In Ephesians 6:18, Paul tells us to "Pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests. With this in mind, be alert and always keep on praying for all the Lord's people."

What should we pray for? Jesus tells us to pray for more workers for the harvest. In Acts 4 the early church prayed for boldness to share the gospel. What does Paul pray for the believers? That they may have spiritual wisdom and revelation, and grow in the knowledge of Christ. That they may be strengthened with power through His Spirit, filled up with the fullness of God, sincere and blameless for the day of Christ, and filled with the fruit of righteousness. That they may comprehend the depth of Christ's love, live worthily of the Lord, abound in love, display all patience and steadfastness, and joyfully give thanks. As we recently studied, James tells us to ask for wisdom. If we look at Jesus' model of prayer, we see: awe and reverence for God; a desire for God's kingdom to come and his will to be done; a request to provide for our needs; confession; asking for forgiveness while forgiving others; and a request to keep us from temptation and evil. In John 17, Jesus prayed for unity for us, the church. In Matthew 5 he tells us to pray for our enemies. In 1 Timothy 2, Paul tells us to pray for the leaders of our countries and for all people. Now that's a lot of people! ©

I could go on, but do you see the depths of prayer that often remain largely unexplored? Our desire as an Elders Team is to explore those further during our prayer time on Sunday mornings. We realize it still needs a good bit of work, and we ask that you join in helping us discern what might work best. Thanks for those of you who have offered input already.

We know that change is always unsettling and that you may be missing the opportunity to share verbally. We will continue to adjust things to allow for people to give their requests and be prayed for personally. Any of the elders would always be glad to pray with you after the service, and I'm sure that many of you in the congregation would be willing to, as well. We are glad to see this happening and encourage it. Also, we encourage participation in small groups, discipleship groups, and the pre-service prayer time—which all give great opportunity for individual prayer to happen.

Pray for wisdom for the Elders Team as we try to provide leadership in this and many other areas of the church. We know we need it, and we desire the Lord to lead us.

Elders' Notes

We began our evening on July 17th (pictured here) by sharing things that we are thankful for; we spent time thanking God for those things and praying about the church, people who were on our hearts, and asking God's guidance for our meeting.

We discussed LCF's upcoming schedule, noting CMC's annual Conference in Indiana and the youth group's upcoming summer trip. We prayed for meaningful experiences and good connections at both. We will host RMM international affiliates on July 29 and have communion and an appreciation potluck for Levi & Cora Miller on August 5. The annual LCF Camp-out will be August 25 & 26, with a baptism on the 26th. Rob is working on details for fall semester Small Groups. Reuben will teach our fall Adult Discipleship Class September 30 to November 18. Our Elders Retreat will be held October 5 & 6.

We discussed communication, both how we as elders communicate with each other, and how we communicate with the congregation. We want to be as open as possible, yet also be mindful of giving privacy in difficult situations.

We want to continue to prioritize discipleship and mentoring at LCF. We discussed a number of discipleship and mentoring opportunities and programs that we currently see going on, and others that may be coming up.

We began the discussion of "How are we doing at LCF?" We want to do things well and for God's glory, but also allow anyone who wants to be able to serve. We like that LCF does not feel like a tightly run performance, but also see areas where we could work at doing a better job. We talked about various areas where we could improve, and how we might do that. We will think and pray about how we are doing in these areas-and will continue this discussion again later. We also want to encourage feedback from the congregation. To that end, Doris is going to put together a short survey for the congregation to give us their feedback concering how we're doing with communcation.

We discussed the possibility of having a fall congregational meeting so that we can share our vision, invite the congregation's thoughts and questions, get feedback about finances and the budget, etc.

Bob closed our time with prayer remembering the situations we discussed. Our next meeting will be August 14th. ■



Riding for a Cause

Preparation is half the battle, and to prepare for the five-day, 375-mile Ride for Missions 2018, Marcus Freed logged 1030 miles on his bike to ensure that he was ready for the journey from Memphis, TN to Montgomery, IN.

Each evening, the 35 riders took the time to pray for the foreign missionaries and the work they do, as well as prayed for them during the day as they rode. Clayton Carner accompanied the group as the SAG (Snacks and Gear) person, and he says, "When we ate dinner, we got to know the riders and heard their stories about how they became Christians."

Marcus says, "This was my 13th ride, and on the first 12 rides we raised over a million dollars for the missions. As of now, over \$94,000 was raised in this year's ride."

One thing in particular that stood out on the ride, to Clayton, happened at a gas station where they stopped for water. "There was an older gentleman who wanted to donate to the ride. He gave us \$100. From what I understood, he is a millionaire who looks for ways to help good causes, and he collects \$5 bills to give away. He gave us our donation in \$5 bills."

A new thing this year was the opportunity to win an RMM Champion Jersey for whoever had the most donor commitments. Marcus won the jersey with donations from 40 sponsors from 7 different states. His goal was to raise \$2018 for the missions, and he well exceeded that goal.

Next year's Ride for Missions will end in Plain City, OH.

Thanks, Marcus and Clayton, for your dedication and hard work. Marcus chose the following scripture for his fundraising letter, and all the glory does, indeed, go to God for the great things that were accomplished on the ride.

"I will praise you, Lord my God, with all my heart; I will glorify your name forever." Psalm 86:12



During our Council meeting on July 24th, the LCF's Child Protection Policy was further discussed. More input was received from members of the congregation, and we took the points to analyze their validity. It is very important that the content in the policy meets the standards expected from our church, and we welcome any additional input from members of the congregation. Outside perspective is very insightful and can only help strengthen the policy.

Jim has an interested person currently looking at the old building for his contracting business. Our feelers are out there for potential buyers. We will continue to update you with information on the sale of the old building.

Jim is gathering more information regarding the concrete entryway. The solution is going to be a little more involved than initially expected. The asphalt is higher than the pad so water seeks out the low spot. During a hard winter, the water freezes underneath causing the pad to heave up. The pad would need to be sloped away but can't exceed ADA limits.

We had also discussed the logistics of LCF's membership renewal timing. It is Council's recommendation that memberships be renewed in September or October, which will make the 2019 budget process more accurate, especially determining the 2019 RMM donation budget.

It is time to seek nominations from the congregation for a LCF Council position that will be opening the first of the year. In addition, the Elders Team will be seeking nominations. A coordinated effort will be made from both teams. If you are interested or if you have a nomination in mind, please feel free to contact a Council or Elders Team Member.

Taking input and suggestions from the congregation collectively for the Elders Team and Council was discussed. The Council unanimously agreed that it was a good idea to look for new avenues to expand the communication process and accessibility to both teams. We talked about an annual congregational meeting but didn't know if we could get a good turnout for it. We had discussed that perhaps an email (survey/question box), text options, or the LCF Connection could be utilized for answering questions that members of the congregation might have.

That's all the Council has for now. We will continue to do our best to keep you informed with all the "goings-on" at LCF. ■
