One of the most beautiful ways that God has designed the church is for us to learn and grow together. "Let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works..." Hebrews 10:24. We need each other to grow in our love and understanding of what it means to follow Jesus. We need to be "stirred up" and encouraged by others.

The only way this will happen is if we continue to study the word of God together. The scripture in Hebrews goes on to tell us to not neglect meeting together, especially as we see the Day of the Lord drawing nearer.

Sunday morning is one of those times to share, connect, worship, and hear the Word of God together. It's an opportunity to put this scripture into practice. However, I believe what's described here goes beyond the once-a-week Sunday morning experience. We need more ways and different ways. Council Update by Jim Jones

Our old church building is currently under contract for \$182,500. Closing is projected to be by October 1st. The prospective buyer owns KLC Services (a light assembly business that produces therapy rehabilitation machines for joint replacement). He plans on making improvements to the old building as well as adding a new 4000 square-foot structure for inventory and shipping. Since the buyer is a previous LCF prospect the real estate commission will only be 1%. Closing expenses are estimated to be \$3,775 with a net of approximately \$178,700.

Due to the rising costs of copies, LCF has cancelled our service agreement with Konica Minolta. Money currently spent on copying expenses will be budgeted into a copy fund towards toner, service and parts and ultimately, in the distant future, a new copier.

Monthly giving for the months of July and August were below average.

On Phyllis Swartz's 10th birthday, her parents gave her the book, "Someday You'll Write" Elizabeth Yates. That someday came true for her this past month with the release of her first book, a memoir titled "Yoder School."

"My parents saw something in me," she said. "I felt like the author of that book was speaking to me, and I did everything she told me to. I made myself a promise I would write a book before I died."

Swartz had the desire to write even before she started school. She learned to read at the age of 3 and began writing. Her first teacher, Alvina Livengood, on whom the memoir is based, took her students on field trips and taught them how to make books and then write in them about their experiences. Swartz decided to be a teacher when she was in first and second grade with Alvina.

The memoir contains a message near and dear to Swartz's heart. "It's about our common struggle to find identity and belonging, to reach across differences toward relationship, and to learn from life, not just live it," she said.

In her book Phyllis shares many life lessons that she took to heart and carried with her into her 30-year teaching career in London City Schools. She credits Alvina for instilling the wonder of learning in her, and has in turn helped many students to capture that same wonder.
