I want to equip the saints. It's time for me to equip others for the work of ministry; to train and give opportunity for others to do what I do—both young and old alike, but especially young people. We want LCF to be a place where every believer has the opportunity to develop and fulfill their calling and use their gifting in the body of Christ.

As you have probably noticed in our recent Elders notes, our leadership team has been talking about how we can spread leadership responsibilities over a broader group of people. Currently, I have way too many people and teams reporting directly back to me. ©

I am happy about a new team of "Service Coordinators" that we formed recently. It currently consists of Vicki Sairs, Youngmi Oh, and myself. We each will take a month being the coordinator for the Sunday morning service. Now that we livestream the service and use pre-recorded videos of people reading scripture, moderating, etc., there are a lot more details that need to be coordinated and communicated to a wide variety of people every week. So if you are scheduled to help out in any way on a Sunday morning, you can expect to receive an email from one of the 3 of us (early in the week) that will include a link to the google doc with service details (which will be updated as the week progresses).

Another way of equipping the saints that I am very excited about is a preaching class that Reuben and myself are leading right now. We have five young men who have expressed interest and are participating in the class. They include: Jeremy Hisey, Zach Freer, Shepherd Ndungu, Chris Conte, and Peyton Miller. on September 24.) They will participate in four classes (once each month from September through December), and then each of them will be scheduled to preach twice in 2021.

This is a great opportunity for LCF to help these young men develop and discern what it is that God may be calling them to and



also for the church to benefit from young leaders that we have among us. This is a sizable class for the size of our congregation, and I am thrilled to have the opportunity to help in preparing these young men for future ministry and see how God is going to use them.

I'm thankful that Reuben and I are able to lead this class together. Reuben brings great wisdom and teaching ability and both of us will be able to share our preaching experiences with these young men. It's a great partnership that I believe will bring much fruit at LCF and beyond.

What can you do? First, I ask that you would encourage and pray for those who take on new responsibilities here at LCF. It takes a lot of courage to step out of your comfort zone and grow in a new area of ministry. It's not easy to deal with challenging situations or stand in front of others and handle the Word of God.

Secondly, be thinking about how God might want you to move out of your own comfort zone—to learn and grow in Christ, and actively serve in his kingdom. A healthy church is where each person is engaged and connected with one another, using their gifts and abilities to serve God and one another. May we each be willing and ready to be stretched and respond in obedience to however God calls us to serve.

We began our time together by sharing prayer requests and praying for each other and the church.

We spent most of our time discussing our services. As far as our children's ministry, Sunday School, etc., we want to do whatever we can to minister to children during this challenging time. For example, the worship team will be trying to add a children's song each Sunday. We are also looking to get some feedback from parents and those who work in childcare and then come up with some ideas of what we might be able to do that most parents and maybe teachers would feel relatively comfortable with. We received the prepackaged communion cups and wafers. We spent time working out some of the details for the communion service planned for October 18th.

We are excited about the small groups we have this fall. We will let each small group decide how they want to handle COVID safety as they meet. We will encourage the leaders to be considerate of the needs and comfort level of each person in the group...and to clearly communicate what their plan of action is with anyone who expresses interest in their group so that people will know what to expect.

As we have for quite a while now, we continue to work on a plan to delegate leadership responsibilities over a broader group of people, skilled in management. We discussed another revision of a possible restructure plan. This one has a lot of similarities to our current structure, which would allow many of our teams to continue to function as normal. We like that it allows the elders to continue in their current role of giving spiritual leadership to the church without expecting them to have managerial skills. We think this looks like a good possibility and are in favor of giving it a try and tweaking it, as needed, as we go along. It was noted that, obviously, with all of the current restrictions, not all of these teams are currently active and functioning; thus, we are working on this in anticipation of when things get back closer to normal. We closed our time with prayer.

Jesus Loves Me!

"Jesus loves me, this I know. For the Bible tells me so..." When we sang that song recently at LCF, I thought back to when I would sing this simple song as a young child and then years later, how I would sing it to my children when they were little. It has laid a great foundation for me to know that I am loved by God. But I wonder...do I really know and understand how MUCH he loves me? If I truly did, I don't think I would be so tempted to worry and stress so easily. I am discovering that when I ponder how much God loves me, I find it easier to trust him-regardless of how I may feel or how my circumstances look. When I know without a doubt that he loves me, then I can be sure that he will take good care of me and will always have my best interest in mind.



So, how do I grow to know and understand how much God loves me? I think the song has it right when it says, "the Bible tells me so." I learn more about God and his great love for me as I spend time with him and reading his Word. I like to try to read through the entire Bible at least every other year, in various ways, with different reading plans,

translations, etc. This year I am reading straight through from the beginning to the end in the New Living Translation. As I read and journal each morning, I look for ways that God reveals his love, and listen for what he wants to say to me specifically.

As I do that, I've found several books to be helpful. One is "66 Love Letters" from God to You by Dr. Larry Crabb. It's "a conversation with God that invites you into His story." When I begin reading a particular book of the Bible, I read the corresponding chapter from Dr. Crabb's book about that "Love Letter." He puts into words some of the questions that I, too, wrestle with and allows me to "listen-in" on his conversation with God. Even though our understanding here on earth is limited, I like when I can fit things together and understand better how the pieces of God's story connect—both in the scriptures and in my own life. I look forward to the day when that knowledge will be made complete in heaven!

Another book I appreciated is one that I checked out from LCF's library, called "66 Ways God Loves You." Jennifer Rothschild, who has been blind since the age of 15, writes about how God expresses his love for us through each book of the Bible. For each of the 66 books, she writes about 4-6 paragraphs about the general message of the book, highlighting a few scripture verses. She adds a practical suggestion for how to make it personal, and wraps it all up in a simple summary phrase. It's an easy book to read and helps you think about how God communicates his love through the Bible. (Note: the flowery design probably appeals more to ladies, but content is applicable for everyone. ©)

The Bible is just the beginning of how God shows me that he loves me! He shows me his incredible love in many different ways every single day—if only I take time to notice. I see it through the love of others, in the beauty of his creation, little reminders that he sends to let me know that he sees me and that he cares, and so much more!

I love the verse in Zephaniah 3:17, where God tells his people: "The Lord your God is with you, he is mighty to save. He will take great delight in you, he will quiet you with his love, he will rejoice over you with singing." May each of us rest securely in God's incredible love and find joy in sharing it with others!
