I unwrapped a pair of dancing shoes, and we talked about how thankful we were that I wasn't paralyzed from the accident. I unwrapped a pillow sewn from pieces of my favorite sweater that was cut off by an ER nurse, and seeing it again brought immediate tears to my eyes. I am so, so grateful to be with my family this holiday season.



On the night of November 30, I hit a patch of ice and flew into oncoming traffic, colliding head-on with another car. While I have healed much physically, I know that mentally and emotionally I still have a ways to go. I've only just begun to process the memories I have from that night, and from the following days. But as often as I find myself looking back to those moments, I've also begun to look forward. And as I get closer and closer to regaining a sense of normalcy, I wonder what "normal" even looks like, and whether I want to go back to the same routines or work toward the same goals as before.

Asking these questions reminds me of my years as a teacher, and of the phrase our assistant principal often used: "begin with the end in mind." In the classroom, we were encouraged to stop and look at the bigger picture, to determine the end goal and what we hoped to accomplish before tackling a lesson.

We taught our students to approach new concepts in this same way—before diving into the nuts and bolts of something unfamiliar, we'd try to help them determine exactly what we hoped to accomplish and why it mattered.

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
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How's Your Bible Reading Going?


Library Link


Bible Reading...continued
