Pam Stanforth: I loved the soft pretzel making before the movie on Friday night! Just like the buttery goodness of those pretzels to our physical

Council Update

Throughout the years some of our church keys have been misplaced. This month we plan to have the exterior doors re-keyed. We will simultaneously re-issue new keys with new security system codes. The old security codes will be purged. Expect an email before and after the changeover takes place.

The internal locks will remain unchanged. For those requiring access to interior locked rooms, two keys will be required, one for the new exterior locks along with your current key for the interior locks.

Serving Those in Wheelchairs

As many of you know, LCF has a wheelchair ramp ministry that started in 2015. We put our first ramp in for a gentlemen in London on November 25, 2015, and he passed a month later



on December 30th. They needed a ramp to get him in and out of the house to take him to his doctor appointments. The ramp was a great blessing to the family even though it was for only one month. We removed the ramp so that it could be installed for another family. That is why the ministry exists. We keep hearing from the families and community agencies (Loving Care, Senior Center, Madison Disability, etc.) about how necessary this ministry is to the community.

So far, we have installed 79 ramps at no costs to the recipients using donated funds from grants (2 grants from Home Depot at \$4,500.00 each), some recipients, and LCF contributions designated for the ramp ministry. Donated funds are used for purchasing materials

only. The average material costs for a ramp is approximately \$450.00. All of the labor is volunteered, and we use our own tools. Of the 79 ramps installed, 25 have been removed and reinstalled for other ramp recipients. So far, no materials have gone to waste.

Our usual process when we get a request for a ramp is:

- We visit the applicant to see what the needs are, what their physical condition is, and if they can afford to pay a contractor for a ramp. If not, we explain that our ministry will install a ramp for free using LCF donations and grant money to pay for the materials and that church volunteers will build and install the ramp.
- We then take measurements and note the elevation differences from the door where
- they want to exit from to the area of ground where they want to end up.
- With that information we design a ramp, purchase the materials, build the ramp off site, haul it to the site, and install it. We help with obtaining building and zoning permits when needed.


The best parts of the ministry are meeting with the recipients and listening to their needs and

hearing how grateful and blessed they are with our help. The other part is coming together as a group of volunteers to install the ramps. It's always a great time of fellowship as we work together. Our volunteers at LCF are the best!

My dream has always been to make this a multi-church ministry. The idea for this ministry came from a friend of mine in Erie, Pennsylvania, who participates in a wheelchair ministry called Ramps of Hope. They shared the details of their program with me so that I could start a similar ministry here in Madison County. I would still like to see the ministry expand to include more churches. I would also like to hand the leadership off to younger people. I am getting up there in years and would hate to see the ministry end when I am longer able to lead it. If you know of anyone who might be interested, I would love to talk with them. Also, if there is anyone who would like to be part of the installation team, please let me know. We usually install the ramps in the evenings or on Saturdays. It usually takes around 2 hours to install a ramp. When you think of this ministry, please remember to pray for those in wheelchairs whom we are serving, for their families, and for those of us who connect with them. May they see the love of Jesus through this ministry!



Here are some fun facts about Steve and Phyllis:

- Before Rob became our pastor, Steve served as LCF's pastor for 17 years, from 1985 to 2002.
- Phyllis recently published a book called Yoder School. Check it out from our church library. With more time, Phyllis plans to continue her writing more seriously.
- Steve is a certified counselor and has counseled countless individuals over the years, doing much of this out of his home office.
- Phyllis taught a total of 30 years. She retired from London City Schools in 2015. She continues to teach and give wise counsel through her blog called "apple to apple" at https://phyllismillerswartz.com.
