
My current plans for after graduation are to stay at home and work, and take some mini trips to some cities that are big in acting right now (Atlanta, NYC, and Chicago).

## Losing Your First Love

### A Message from the Pastor

When I became a Christian at age 14 and for at least a couple of years after that, I experienced my first love for Jesus Christ. My previous world would not have been described as wholesome or safe, and most observers would have thought I was headed for trouble if not just for a lot of pain. But Jesus got a hold of me. I was ignorant, I was inconsistent and hard to take as a new believer. I was a weird mixture of old and worldly for my age, but just as unformed and full of immaturity as any 14 year old. When Jesus came into my life, however, I had a strong sense of gratitude, of having been delivered, healed, and restored. I loved Jesus. Whatever else complicated the picture, I knew which direction to go, and knew that the closer I got to Jesus the closer I was to being whole.

I eventually learned more, but like a lot of Christians some of the passion cooled. I went through a few years that I'm not terribly proud of. I lumped along. My faith was there, but my zeal and faithfulness weren't. And eventually my sense of peace, joy and stability faded with them. Correction wasn't pleasant, and when a Christian friend quoted Hebrews 12 to me, I sensed immediately that it applied. It was prophetic.

*And you have forgotten the exhortation which speaks to you as to sons: "My son, do not despise the chastening of the Lord, Nor be discouraged when you are rebuked by Him; For whom the Lord loves He chastens, And scourges every son whom He receives."*

I think that losing your first love is a pretty common experience for believers. I can assure you Jesus won't let you go, even when you've loosened your own grip.

What if whole churches find their first love fading? Jesus spoke directly to the church at Ephesus in Revelation 2. They had done many things well, but...

*Nevertheless I have this against you, that you have left your first love. Remember therefore from where you have fallen; repent and do the first works, or else I will come to you quickly and remove your lampstand from its place—unless you repent.*

Maybe such a church needs to go out of business. Here's some pure speculation, a suspicion. There's a little objective evidence but not much, and I would love to find out I'm wrong! When I sense that Christians are all about "the news"—all about some kind of passion that doesn't seem to involve Jesus or drawing near to him; when I sense that for many Christians Bible reading is hard and uninteresting; when prayer is more like muttering to heaven while we do other things; when our faces are glued to our phones, and whatever identity we establish with the world has become our passion in place of being in Christ; when we conform to a social or political identity in this world, and forget that we are not to be conformed to this world, or to be unequally yoked with it, then I wonder. Actually I ache.

If what I sense is true, a lot of the church finds itself there now, in a dry and depleted period. I'm referring to the church broadly—not necessarily LCF, but I don't think we're immune either. How do we get back? I don't think there is a formula. As always I say, beware of leaders and prophets with formulas who try to insert their own agendas at this point. The way back exists not in something new, but in something old, in remembering and returning. Jesus said: "Remember therefore from where you have fallen; repent and do the first works..." ■

The new church entry key and security alarm code re-issue has been going smoothly. Look for an updated instruction and contact sheet for the alarm entry pad by the main entry doors.

The audiovisual booth is complete. Nathaniel Smith did an awesome job from start to finish completing the audio visual booth expansion. The equipment is being moved and optimized.

EMM reduced our mortgage rate on our church building from 4.5% to 4.0%. Currently our remaining balance is \$110,722, with a projected church payoff in 3.5 years. ■
