An Invaluable Investment

About this time two years ago, I was in a hard place. I was a mother of four little ones struggling to get through and enjoy daily life and my numerous blessings, because up until that point, I had been unable to process and simply "deal with" some trauma from my past. I had allowed fear, guilt, and shame to grow where hope, forgiveness, and identity in Christ should have. I had become someone who struggled greatly with anxiety, and often had more hard days than good ones. It was affecting my marriage and my parenting.

I came to the realization that I couldn't process and heal from my past trauma on my own. Through the guidance and care of my pastor and his wife, I was introduced to a biblical counselor and began counseling with him.

It has taken a lot of time and work, but biblical counseling has changed everything for me. Through it, I have begun to heal and am learning my true identity in Christ. I am growing to understand who



God really is—without filtering everything through the lens of my trauma. Biblical counseling has restored my faith that as Paul says in Philippians 1:6: "...He who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ." I am learning how to do a better job of taking my thoughts captive and replacing them with God's truths.

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Do Not Judge

A Message from the Pastor by Reuben Sairs

The Bible is clear-do not judge.

- "Do not judge, and you will not be judged. Do not condemn, and you will not be condemned. Forgive, and you will be forgiven." Luke 6:37
- *"Who are you to judge the servant of another?"* Romans 14:4
- *"Judge nothing before the time."* 1 Corinthians 4:5

These passages don't mean you should suspend your brain, they only suspend your personal judgment of others. We can certainly disagree, and of course we have to make choices and decisions, but we must be very objective and careful and you might say somewhat ironically "nonjudgmental," even in disagreement with others.

I want to combine two thoughts—being nonjudgmental and how that should be one important way that we practice nonconformity with the unbelieving world.

LCF stands in the historic tradition of Mennonites. We can call this the Anabaptist tradition. It has a long history of emphasizing nonconformity to the world; Jesus shapes us so we're not like the unbelieving world. Although we have in fact been a very judgmental group historically, nonconformity should have led us out of that problem. It's certainly not too late!

As an extreme example of judgment, it is not my job, and in fact it would be a sin for me, to declare who is or is not a real Christian. It might be one thing to ask someone who says they are, "Are you a Christian?" out of concern. It would be another matter to ask it implying, "No, I don't think so." Less dramatically, it's still improper for me to declare who is a Christian who counts, or is worthy of the name, or deserves my fellowship and should get my unqualified affection.

It's always a temptation to judge others. I look around and there are so-called Christians who apparently think they can believe anything they want, and do whatever they want and still somehow claim to be authentic. I look for the fruit of the Spirit, and all I see is a jumble of thinking and behavior that I can't square with the Bible. But I am not allowed to judge. It would be wrong to close my heart and walk away. We should all remember the tax collector and the Pharisee in prayer in Luke 18:11. I'm sure there is much in my own life that is inconsistent, and this gives me plenty to work on without trying to straighten out someone else.

History demonstrates how hard this is. Christians disfellowship other Christians. Many new churches are started blatantly that way. It sounds more noble, but even in church planting, new churches can be started with an implied judgment: all of God's other churches are not quite right or up to the task. No judgment there?

Let's start with some self-examination. We can rejoice in the work of nonconformity that the Spirit is doing in the Church through our lives. We can get to that point where we can say we have been changed by Jesus. Let the world be judgmental, critical, defensive. Let the world be full of insults and threats. These things have no place in Christian fellowship. We root our nonconformity in the character that God is creating in us and leave judgment where it belongs—with Jesus.

The Elders met on January 11th and welcomed Gideon and Sarah Eichorn to the Elders' Team.

A summary of our meeting:

- We spent time praying for the various needs within the LCF family.
- We talked about ways to shepherd the flock God has put under our care.
- We approved the 2023 Budget Proposal we received from the Council.
- We discussed details for Celebrate the Church Sunday, which will be held on January 15th. We are looking forward to receiving six new members.
- We reviewed our annual renewal process for membership at LCF.
- We concluded our time in prayer. ■

Council Update

Thanks to you as a congregation for approving the proposed 2023 budget with your vote on Sunday, January 22 and for your continued generous giving throughout the year.

We were blessed to end 2022 with a surplus balance of \$14,151.92. We decided to apply \$5,000 of that surplus toward our mortgage principle. That reduces the amount that we currently owe on our loan for this building to just under \$51,000. The remaining amount of the surplus was kept back to cover anticipated church maintenance costs.

Sarah received 2023 budget requests from the Audio/ Visual Team, Benevolence Team, and Decor Team. The other teams were good to repeat with the same allocations as they had in 2022. Some increases were made—mainly supplies for fellowship, trash pick-up (due to increased fuel costs) and other budget items that were affected due to inflation.

In 2022, the Council increased the salaries for Rob, Reuben, and Doris by 5%. For 2023, they were increased by an additional 2%. Dale and Sharon Headings, who clean the church every week, received a 5% increase in 2023. Even though Sarah disagreed, the other council members agreed that an increase was in order for the church treasurer position, as well. Russ did the calculations. For the average hours that Sarah puts in each month, at a modest rate of \$15 per hour, an additional \$28.25 per month increase was given to her.

We decided to allocate mileage reimbursement funds for Mike and Karen Baker for the miles that they drive each week for youth group meetings (an estimated 134 miles each month).

We are thankful to God for His faithful provision to meet our needs here at LCF—both in providing the people needed and funds necessary to carry out the task He has given us! If you ever have any quesitons, feel free to contact us.

As I drove to work one morning, I could see only a small section of the road in front of me. The rest of my view was shrouded in fog. Signs seemed to appear out of nowhere, and bends in the road caught me by surprise. It was scary to drive with so little visibility.

If you have a moment, take the time to read the whole chapter. Here are some of my favorite verses from it.
