On Sunday, November 27th, the Council and Elders gave an update on LCF's financial position indicating that we have been significantly exceeding our budget for almost every month in 2023.

How should we think about this information? It reminds me of a conversation Doris and I had recently with our daughter, Larissa, about what it looks like to depend on God to supply our needs. Her dad (me) was arguing that there is a balance between trusting God and being responsible while Larissa was suggesting we should simply trust God to provide for what we need. She's onto something, and I think it's the way we should think of our situation at LCF.

We should trust that God will supply our needs "according to his riches in glory." Do we have a responsibility? Yes. Of course. But none of this ministry at LCF over the past 39 years is a result of human effort. It's the result of God's work in people and through people to accomplish his purposes. We can't really take credit for any of it. Should we worry about it? No. If we need to make financial cuts should we feel discouraged? No. As Reuben reminded us at our elders retreat, "God's not out of money."

I see God at work among us. I see our church giving in many different ways to benevolence, to missions, RI (our mission agency), Rosedale Bible College, etc. You are a generous church! I see people growing in their faith. I see young people bringing their friends to youth group. I see older people still faithfully serving after many years of serving the church. I see new people and new vision and new ideas for ministry. I see God at work, and my guess is that you do, as well. He is faithful. Jesus is building his church and nothing will stop it. I have no idea how long London Christian Fellowship will exist, but I'm confident that "The Church" will prevail and that God will supply everything needed for that to happen. It may not look like I think (and most times it doesn't), but this is not a time for hand-wringing or worry. It is a time to trust in God.

Are there things for us to do? Sure! We can give. We can be careful about spending. We can pray. And we can continue to preach the Word, share the gospel, care for the fellowship of believers, love the lost, worship our King, and all the other things we are called to do by the head of the church, Jesus Christ. As we do those things, we can be confident that our Heavenly Father will supply every need that we have.

As a pastor, I feel blessed to be a part of our fellowship at LCF, and I'm looking forward to continuing the work he has called us to, as well as to doing the new things he is preparing for us in 2024. I'm thankful for each one of you and your part in the ministry at LCF!

Council Update

The Council met via phone on November 21st. LCF's financial situation was the biggest part of our discussion. Here's a snapshot of our average monthly giving over the past four years: 2020: \$15,700, 2021: \$15,000, 2022: \$16,900, and 2023: \$12,600.

Historically, our working budget is \$200,000. Given our average 2023 monthly income, our 2024 budget will be \$160,000. Our 2023 cash reserves have dropped from \$86,500 to \$62,000 (- \$24,500). Even with our church mortgage payoff in 8 months (\$3,000 per month) it is not feasible to maintain our current income-to-expense ratio.

That \$40,000 difference will leave many ministries and missions starting off this new year unfunded. Our hope and plan is to start slow and finish strong. As giving increases we will take the surplus to fund the ministries and missions. We will look to the Elders Team to prioritize those needs.

Because of the urgency of our high electric rate and propane costs, \$600 will be used to purchase WiFi enabled thermostats. In addition, the church-use policy for special events is being reviewed to determine if a fee should be assessed to help cover the high energy costs. The council is also searching for some bid comparisons for lawn care and snow removal.

There have been some questions regarding our coffeeuse policy. Coffee, tea, hot chocolate, and related hot beverage supplies at LCF are available for Sunday morning services and other LCF sponsored events. Since these supplies are primarily utilized for Sunday morning services, individuals choosing to use the hot beverages for their LCF sponsored events are responsible to alert the Sunday Morning Coffee coordinator when the group consists of more than 10 individuals consuming hot beverages to ensure there are adequate supplies for Sunday morning fellowship. Individuals and groups renting or reserving the church for functions are expected to provide their own hot beverages and supplies.

Our next meeting is scheduled for December 19th. As always, we invite you to contact any of us (Russ, Sarah, Rhoda, or myself) with your questions and comments.

Elders' Retreat Notes

Our 2023 Elder's Retreat took place at the home of Rob and Doris on November 10 & 11 due to a scheduling mishap at the Proctor Center. Attendees included: Roger and Sharon Hazen, Reuben and Vicki Sairs, Abraham and Naomy Ndungu, Gideon Eichorn, Keith and Shannon Scheffel, Jeremy and Mandy Hisey, and Rob and Doris Swartz. The retreat began with Friday evening worship and sharing of joys and struggles from



the past year. Saturday morning involved reading and discussing Ezekiel 34, reflecting on ways we've seen God at work, and discussing dreams we have for LCF, including growth, clear Anabaptist witness, congregational participation, community service, and biblical literacy.

The financial situation of the congregation was a significant topic, with a decrease in the average monthly income from \$17,000 in 2022 to \$12,000 in 2023. Plans to pay off the mortgage in July 2024 were mentioned, but concerns were raised about potential budget cuts in 2024. The elders suggested communication with the congregation, prayer, and a careful approach to any budget adjustments.

Other topics we discussed included the Lifepointe Family Center, financial counseling initiatives, and plans for events like Valentine's Date Night, Celebrate the Church Sunday, and acknowledging the 40th anniversary of Shalom/LCF on April 22. The elders also expressed support for using the BAND App for church communication in the coming months. Our next meeting will be on December 1st.

The Challenge and Blessings of Reading God's Word

Last year about this time, Doris told me about a year-long Bible reading plan called "The Bible Recap" and invited me to join her in reading it in 2023. I was finishing up "Read through in '22" with our LCF family and, while I found that rewarding, it had been a challenge for me, and so I was not sure I was ready to commit to reading through the entire Bible in a year again. But when 2023 began, I found myself in the habit of daily Bible reading and needed some sort of direction, so I cautiously began The Bible Recap reading plan. Here it is, almost the end of 2023, and I am getting



ready to complete my 2nd time reading through God's Word. It takes a lot of time but has been so rewarding.

The Bible Recap plan is set up chronologically. After reading the portion of scripture there is a 7-10 minute follow-up video that I watch on YouTube (or you can listen to a podcast of it if you prefer). Tara-Leigh Cobble gives a "recap" of what we just

read and adds some commentary. After her recap, she shares a daily "God Shot" about something we can learn about God from that day's passage. She always closes by reminding us that "He's where the joy is."

I love to study the Bible. I highlight, underline, circle, make notes, etc., all over the pages of my Bible. There is always something to learn, and often the more I study, the more I realize how much I don't know or understand. I am very thankful that I live on this side of the cross, in a time in history where the Bible is so easily accessible. The Bible is God's Word to us. How amazing is that! The story of Jesus runs through it—the whole way from Genesis to Revelation. It teaches us how to live and how to love. It shows us the path to salvation. Let's not take it for granted.

Whether you are trying to decide on a reading plan for next year or if you have never read the Bible before—I encourage you to make time to read and study God's Word every day. Before you read it, ask God to speak to you through it. The Bible tells us: "All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness" (2 Timothy 3:16). I like to begin by praying the words of Psalm 119:18: "Open my eyes that I may see wonderful things in your law." I hope that all of us will learn to know and love God better as we spend time in His Word!
