### A New App for the New Year

We are currently trying out a new app called BAND in hopes that it will simplify our communication and enhance our connection with one another.

Rob has been observing BAND for about a year with Olentangy Community Church (the church in Columbus where he serves as Overseer), and our elders team has been using it for the past several months. Here are some of the things we like about it:

- It keeps all our communication and information in one central place.
- It allows everyone (who is part of the group) the opportunity to be able to post directly to it themselves (make announcements, schedule events, share prayer requests, needs, etc.).
- It allows those in the group the opportunity to reply and interact with posts made.
- It provides a way for quick and easy feedback through surveys and polls.
- It keeps all of the posts/replies in its own string of conversation.
- It gives an easy way for people to RSVP to events and to add them to their personal calendar.
- You can use it on your phone, tablet, and/or your computer.

Those are just some of the reasons why we think it could be a helpful app for us as a church. We'd like to hear what you think! We would love to have as many of you as possible join us to try it over the next several months and give us your feedback. If you are an active part of our LCF family, see the email that you received recently for more details and instructions on how to get started. If there are some of you who don't want to try it out yet, we will continue to send the main church information out by email, for the time being.

If you have any questions or trouble, feel free to reach out to anyone on LCF's tech team, and we will be glad to help you get it installed and navigate the app. We realize that some of us enjoy new things more than others and that learning something new can be challenging and uncomfortable to begin with, so we want to give ourselves several months to adjust. We are looking forward to this new opportunity and are hopeful that it will help us BAND together a bit more, as a church family!

# Becoming a New Person

#### A Message from the Pastor by Reuben Sairs

Sometimes we fall into the trap of thinking that Christian discipleship—following Christ, is two long lists—things we ought to do and things we ought not do. We walk through each day hoping that the balance sheet looks right by bedtime or at least sometimes. This is a trap because it makes our life in Jesus a question of our moral energy. We must keep things moving, but our frequent failures probably result in unhappiness, or at least in us having to overlook a lot to preserve our balance.

Our discipleship should be measured in what kind of people we are or are becoming. What we do flows from the work Jesus does in us through his Holy Spirit. Transformation is the key to discipleship—growth from the inside, change, formation, becoming. Real repentance happens when we have a change of heart, mind, and will. It is that internal process led and fed by God that results in actual changes in what we do or step back from doing.

Of course, we measure these changes in ourselves by examining our behavior, but some of our most worthy opponents (in our sinful nature) fight in sneaky ways. What are the corrupting sins of our nature? Consider our greed, our anger, our violence, our superiority and entitlement, our selfishness and self-absorption, our frequent dullness about loving God. These things have to change from within. They are too much a part of us to yield to our intentions to change.

One passage describing the character that Christ is forming in us comes to my mind fairly often. Maybe I'm in special need of it? The passage offers nothing specific in terms of applications, and a shallow citing of the verses makes it sound like a platitude You know platitudes—those wise-old pieces of moral advice that are often heard but have lost their energy—frequently cited but usually not getting us anywhere. The passage comes from James 1:19-20.

"So then, my beloved brethren, let every man be swift to hear, slow to speak, slow to wrath; for the wrath of man does not produce the righteousness of God."

This is the person I want to be, at least in my better moments. I assume that wanting it is the first step in the right direction. I admit that my natural inclinations all seem to run in the opposite direction. How often am I already formulating my response, before another person is finished talking? Am I really even listening to them much at all?

I'm trying to have fewer opinions, and be less in need of sharing MY viewpoint all the time. I'm trying to shake the sin of human anger. It leads nowhere good. So often when we're angry, we're righteously angry. We're on God's side, so we don't need to listen to others--we have no time for their perspectives. They don't know. We're doing the work of God so our job is to talk and overwhelm the forces of evil and ignorance with our bold words. God's on our side, so of course we're angry, and if someone else doesn't share that anger it just shows us what a spiritual knucklehead they are. We're doing the very work of God, so righteousness will flow from our angry assertiveness. The punchline is in verse 20. No, it won't.

## **Denying Myself** In a World of Entitlement

Lately I have been thinking a lot about the series Rob preached from Philippians 2. It's fascinating how the way Jesus lived his life here on earth as an example for us, is so opposite of the way the world teaches us to live. We are bombarded with advertisements of things we "need" to entertain us and fulfill our enjoyment in life. Society tells us that we are entitled to be upset or hurt when others disagree with our beliefs. Meanwhile, we read these words about Jesus, who truly was entitled to anything He desired, "who, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be grasped, but made himself nothing, taking the very nature of a servant."

Jesus came here to serve, not to be served. As believers of Jesus, He has called us to follow him. He said if "anvone desires to come after Me. let him denv himself, and take up his cross, and follow me."

I don't know about you, but denying myself is an extremely difficult thing to do. I typically feel entitled to spend my free time how I want to spend it. I like to spend my time doing things I enjoy. But as I reflect on the life of Christ, and how He has called us to live, I realize that doesn't add up.

So how can I reconcile the two? As followers of Jesus. our ultimate purpose in life is to point others to Him. In John 3:30, John the Baptist said this, "He must become greater, I must become less." John had it figured out. How can we point others to Jesus if our focus is always on ourselves?

Jesus's way of life is at odds with the world. Most of us, at some point in our life, have probably wanted to make a name for ourselves in some area, achieving a position of importance or a title of recognition. If you can relate, you are not alone. The disciples did, as well, until Jesus set them straight in Matthew 20. Jesus said, "whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wants to be first must be your slave, just as the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many."

In his series, Rob shared about the Great Reversal that is to come where those who exalt themselves here on earth will be humbled and those who humble themselves will be exalted. The world tells us we are entitled to live our best life. But for us, as believers and followers of Jesus, as Rob said, it is about giving our best life now so that we can receive the best that is to come in the next life.
