I'm mildly unsettled as a message from the Psalms becomes more relevant. Psalm 71:18:

Now also when I am old and gray-headed, O God, do not forsake me, Until I declare Your strength to this generation, Your power to everyone who is to come.

I'm getting older, and so are you. Bodies change, minds change. I've lost some powers, but I've gained some others. I've acquired some beliefs, but I've changed and surrendered some, too. I suppose in some ways I've become weaker, but in others I'm much stronger.

The soul, the real true me, may reflect but is not restricted by my mortal existence. Hopefully, as we grow in wisdom; we will exhibit the fruit of the Holy Spirit; we will speak from experience that will stabilize and control perspectives, opinions and passions. Be that as it may, the earthly part of us will have to wind down, and appear pretty weak to those who will have to care for us. But the soul has a different trajectory, and even though it is often mysterious, the soul is undoubtedly getting us ready...

Psalm 92 is what I will try to make the window into my future:

They were both men who, in so many words, said that their goal was to get old without getting cranky. I've tried to take their advice and admire their examples.

I imagine you've seen the types. Some older people become embittered, unhappy, dissatisfied with life. They shrink. Others seem to maintain joy, wonder, and not become overly-delicate. They grow.

One of my goals even as I age is to live in a bigger world, and not a smaller and smaller world. I want my views to expand not contract. I want to grow broader, not more narrow. I don't see any merit in pulling back into a tinier existence. It is unrealistic to think this all happens on a physical plane. The day will come for all of us when our strength will be a question of what is happening inside our skulls, in that thing called a mind. But that really matters! Get older and as you do, let your mind soar with our Lord.

I'm sure countless generations have found inspiration in Isaiah 40.

Even the youths shall faint and be weary,
And the young men shall utterly fall,
But those who wait on the Lord
Shall renew their strength;
They shall mount up with wings like eagles,
They shall run and not be weary,
They shall walk and not faint.

- No charge: funerals, weddings, showers and recognized LCF regular and infrequently held events and community service/outreach as approved by LCF Leadership Team.
- Fees will be assessed for one-time nonchurch sponsored family events such as birthday parties, reunions, graduation parties, and anniversaries.
- \$100.00 for groups up to 20 people, \$150.00 for groups larger than 20 people.
- Additional possible fee for Technician Services (Audio, Visual...) as needed, based on availability. Only qualified members of the LCF sound/audio team may operate the audio and visual equipment.

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So Rob and I agreed that it seemed like it was time for me to "retire" from my administrative responsibilities. I knew that it would not be easy to give up the job I have loved for so many years and that it would require a great step of faith for me. I would need to trust that God would: provide a suitable, available, and willing replacement for me, take care of the church and its needs, (especially, my pastor-husband, who has been my "boss" for 24 years), provide for us financially (since it would mean giving up my monthly paycheck), and give me grace for the transition and adjustments.

God has graciously proven faithful and allowed me to see Him at work in many different ways. He gave me a great sense of peace as I turned in my resignation and pondered the upcoming changes. He provided Jodi Traverse right away, to apply for, and accept the position. He reminded me in tangible ways that He sees our needs and that He will be faithful to care for us.
