This last year was our second year of leading a small group for young families at LCF. We met at the church mostly to read and discuss the book of Romans. The members of our small group all had young children, and we were able to secure childcare through a Rosedale Bible College volunteer program which worked out great for the group. Our kids loved going to small group last year and the students were awesome.

Our goal was to try and meet every week, with the foreknowledge that there would be a lot of cancellations during the school year due to sicknesses or school programs that couldn't be missed. The approach we took was that if at least two families could meet then we would have group. To wait for larger attendance prevented us from making much progress with our study.

We would also meet up at our home or at a playground on many occasions for potlucks or for our kids to play outside with no study intentions. This allowed the group to grow closer together and form a bond within the church community that sometimes is hard to achieve when only attending on Sunday morning. We plan on taking a similar approach this year and would love it if other young families joined the group. If you have any questions, please reach out to my wife Lara or myself. 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What better way to appreciate our pastor then to actually observe a week of life...

This is my summary from a phone interview with Pastor Rob...

Pam: "Pastor, share with me a typical day or week in your life."

Pastor Rob: "What is this about?"

Pam: "Well, it is not anything against you...LOL ... "

Pastor Rob: "I trust that it isn't, but let me think now... nothing is typical, that's for sure. Plan, pray, plan, expect the unexpected, and end in prayer.

"Monday: Our declared Sabbath. Sunday marks the end of a pastor's week, and I am usually exhausted, ready to focus on rest and time with Doris. We avoid chores, try not to think about church events, and often go out to eat. Most Mondays, we get to rest, but not always. Emergencies, loss of life, or critical issues can arise, requiring my attention.

"Tuesday: If I am scheduled to preach the following Sunday, I begin preparing my next sermon. I usually have a few ideas and start studying, waiting to see where God leads. There are calls to take and make. I also meet with pastors from our conference monthly as well as with a multi-denominational pastor group from the London area.

"Thursday: By this day, I need to have most of my sermon written and the title sent to our secretary so the rest of the Sunday leaders know the theme. Truthfully, I am often still finishing up well into Saturday afternoon. Many times, I get bits and pieces of my sermon in the middle of the night. Doris and I also do marital counseling. Weddings, while fun, can be a bit stressful due to planning details, locations, and pictures.

"Since we currently don't have a Worship Coordinator or a Children's Ministry Coordinator, I spend quite a bit of time assisting with making those schedules. Sammy, Jesse, and I all work together to come up with the tech and worship team schedules. Currently, I also line up the teachers for our Sunday School classes.

"Additionally, I organize small groups, handle sign-ups, and work on promotion brochures with Jodi. Doris and I host LCF 101 and also meet with people individually throughout the year who are wanting to learn more about LCF, be baptized, etc. Doris is a great help and hosts participants in our home. We also hold a neighborhood Bible study for kids and an individual Bible study for a shut-in. We try to jump in and help church members move, take meals, etc. as much as possible.

"I love one-to-one conversations and guiding individuals as they prayerfully consider their service towards God. I enjoy mentoring several young men within our congregation as they explore their callings. A few years ago, Reuben held preaching classes for some young men. Many of those have preached from our pulpit. Jeremy, in particular, has continued to preach regularly. I deeply appreciate Reuben's gift to our church. He is a dedicated teacher, working full-time at Rosedale while supporting me as Associate Pastor. Often, he and Vicki have been voices of reason, sharing wisdom with the Elders Team. Reuben was instrumental in guiding us as we re-implemented a time of offerings and tithing during our Sunday Morning Services. I am thankful for both Reuben and Vicki.

"Doris and I often meet with various people in the congregation to just check in and see how they are doing. We try to schedule more of those meetings on weeks when I'm not preaching. We also provide support during difficult times of loss, for families or individuals facing critical crises, and for people who just need prayer, a listening ear, or words of hope..

Pam: Thank you for listening to the Holy Spirit, for studying to show yourself approved, for teaching us, and for listening to us. God bless you, Pastor Rob!

To bring it home, LCF and others in the community look to our pastors for guidance and support. Appreciation is rare, and we apologize. Our pastors are of immense value to each of us at LCF! We are blessed with Rob and Reuben as our pastors. They are a gift to us, and we commit to praying for them and their families.

August income was \$15,149 which was more than our expenses of \$12,464 by \$2,685.

Our YTD income is \$137,945 compared to our YTD expenses of \$117,185, which leaves a YTD balance of +\$20,760.

The quarterly payment to RNOC as well as payments to Rosedale International and Rosedale Bible College will be made yet in September. These payments will continue to keep us on schedule during 2024.

Sarah contacted Precision Hardscapes to obtain an estimate for snow removal at the church. She is still waiting on a response and will follow up with another call. Messages to Allscapes have also gone with no response. Other suggestions are welcome and please send those to Russ Hauge.

The Premise Use Policy continued to be reviewed and discussed with the need for further updates to remove ambiguous language resulting in almost every request being an exception. Potential changes were exchanged in writing for further review and updates during the next Council meeting. Once an updated document is created, it will be sent to the Elders Team for review and any additional suggestions.

Keith Scheffel has agreed to assist Sarah as "a second set of eyes" on our financial reporting on a quarterly basis. As stated previously, there are no current issues and we are just attempting to take the pressure off our sole Treasurer in the future.

There was a short discussion on the weekly in-person offering process. Specifically related to control/placement of the offering and the follow-up process to ensure that it is counted and securely forwarded to the Treasurer. A discussion with the lead ushers is the next step to document this process.
